In the context of the violent historical circumstances of his day, James, the brother of Jesus, wrote this epistle sometime before 62 AD, the year he was killed.

The 50's saw the growth of turmoil and violence in the Roman region called Judea, as the Jews became more and more frustrated with the corruption, injustice and poverty caused by the occupying Roman army. It continued into the 60's, in the years just before James was killed. War broke out with Rome and would lead to the destruction of Jerusalem and the scattering of the people, accentuated eventually by the destruction of the temple in 70 AD.



This epistle is renowned for exhortations on

- fighting poverty and caring for the poor in practical ways (1:26-27; 2:1-4; 2:14-19; 5:1-6),
- standing up for the oppressed (2:1-4; 5:1-6), and
- not being "like the world" in the way one responds to the evil being demonstrated around them (1:26-27; 2:11; 3:13-18; 4:1-10).

Worldly wisdom is rejected and people are exhorted to embrace heavenly wisdom, which includes peacemaking without passively ignoring the need for righteousness and justice (3:13-18).



This approach sees the epistle as a real letter with a real immediate purpose: to encourage Christian Jews not to revert to violence in their response to injustice and poverty but to

- stay focused on doing good,
- staying committed to a holy lifestyle,
- and to embrace the wisdom of heaven, rather than that of the world.

- His death by stoning came at the hands of Ananus ben Ananus, the chief priest in 62 AD.

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- 4 have you not then made distinctions among yourselves and become judges with evil thoughts?
- Listen, my beloved brothers, has not God chosen those who are poor in the world to be rich in faith and heirs of the kingdom, which He has promised to those who love Him?
- 6 But you have dishonored the poor man. Are not the rich the ones who oppress you, and the ones who drag you into court?
- 7 Are they not the ones who blaspheme the honorable name by which you were called?

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- If you really fulfill the royal law according to the Scripture "You shall love your neighbor as yourself," you are doing well.
- 9 But if you show partiality, you are committing sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors.
- 10 For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become guilty of all of it.
